


Early Life

- Born December 8th, 1894, on a self-described "night of wild portent" in Columbus, Ohio, to Mary Fisher Thurber and Charles L. Thurber, the second of the family's three sons.
- At age 7 Thurber was shot in the eye by an arrow while playing with his brothers. He lost sight in that eye, and later went increasingly blind in the other.
- 1912-1918 attended Ohio State University but couldn't pass the ROTC tests with his poor eyesight. Awarded a degree posthumously, 1995.
- 1922 Married Althea Adams, who he met at OSU.
- Spent a few years working for the U.S. Department of State, and then a few years reporting for papers including the Chicago Tribune and the Columbus Dispatch.


New York

- Moved to Greenwich 1925 and writes for the New York Post
- Met E.B. White, and Harold Ross hired him as the editor of the New Yorker in 1927.
- 1931 Rosemary Thurber born.
- In 1935 Thurbers marriage ended in divorce. He married Helen Wismar, an editor, and they move to Connecticut.
- Thurber continued to freelance for the New Yorker and publish work prolifically until his death in 1961.








JAMES THURBER A sure grasp of confusion.








Writing

- Honorary Doctorates from Kenyon College in Ohio, Williams College in Massachusets, and Yale University. As well as a Posthumous Humane Doctor of Letters from alma matter Ohio State.
- The Thurber Prize was established in 1997 for outstanding humorists.
- Two of his residences are now historic places.
